Over the past few weeks students have been creating nature themed images to contribute to our school wide mural. The focus of this year's mural is inspired by The Big Book of Belonging. In the words of the author,

Student voice is highlighted on hand shapes, staff voice is highlighted on heart shapes and parent voice is represented on stars. The combination of visual art and literacy work will be on display at the front of our school for the rest of the school year to honour and celebrate the diversity of our identities, experiences, histories, interests and backgrounds.




September 30 -National Day of Truth and Reconciliation

School supplies and student agendas



The Board of School Trustees has approved the Schools Supplies Service Program for 2024- 2025. The cost to each student is \$33.00. The School Board continues to offer this service as a cost saving support to families and it is also as a way of standardizing basic supplies for classroom use. Exercise books, duo tangs, papers, pencils, pens,

crayons, rulers, erasers, glue etc. are supplied in quantities appropriate to each grade. In the meantime, students will be given all the school supplies they need for the first six weeks of the school year. Payment is set up through our school cash online program.






Student Absence/Early Warning - Call 604-668-6275 Option 1
